#### IS DEEMING -JACK THE RIPPER ?

Fredrick Bailey Deeming was a globetrotting murderer, who killed two wives and his four children. Deeming is suspected by some to be the Whitechapel murderer 'Jack the Ripper'. Captured in the small goldfields' town of Southern Cross in Western Australia, his transfer back to Melbourne, involved a night spent at the Albany Convict Gaol.

Deeming was transported by train to Albany and transferred to the care of the Gaol Warder, McGovern. Come morning, to the disbelief of his minders, Deeming was missing his most distinctive large moustache. In Deeming's prison clothes, they found a piece of glass from a medicine bottle that he used as a razor, it was also apparent that Deeming had plucked most of his moustache out during the night. To the concern of Detective Cawsey, the missing moustache made Deeming look completely different and that the moustache could decide the prosecution's case.

The last few days before Deeming was executed rumours of his possible connection to the Whitechapel Murders in London's East End continued. There was also rumours that Deeming had confessed to two of the Whitechapel Murders but was ignored as police believed he was trying to stall the date with the gallows.

#### THE LAST HANGING

There was only one hanging at the Old Gaol in 1872. Peter McKean alias William McDonald, murdered his neighbour at Slab Hut Gully between Mt Barker and Kojonup. To save ten witnesses travelling to Perth for the trial, they held the proceedings in Albany.

McDonald had a dubious record and was the only felon hanged at the Old Gaol. The hangman as well as the portable gallows came from Fremantle to do the court's bidding.

#### THE BLACK HOLE

The paranormal activity in the Gaol's Black Hole – a name given to the cell used for solitary confinement with no windows or light and once held up to 20 drunken soldiers at one time and they were kept in the 'hole' for 24 hours in which it is reported that up to three died.

Could the inmates, that once wandered the cellblock, be returning with a message, for a chosen few?

## **GHOSTLY ENCOUNTERS**

You never know what ghostly things, you may encounter at the Albany Convict Gaol, but it has been reported that unexplainable sounds both from visitors and the museum staff include, wailing to taps and knocks echoing, doors shutting with no draft, to tiny whispers and the sound of footsteps on the old wood floorboards.

A truly tragic story is of an Aboriginal woman in Cell 25 who lost her baby during childbirth, only to pass away herself. Many have claimed to hear a baby crying in the area and others have said to have heard her sad sobs and that she is distraught.

People who have worked in the Albany Convict Gaol and some visitors have related experiences of ghostly happenings around the female cells. These include the sound of a baby crying. Several of Warder McGovern's children died while living at the Convict Gaol, there are theories that the ghosts belong to them.

When entering the Gaol, you may have an encounter with a black cat when walking by Room 5 and hear the faint sound of a purr or a slight rub against your leg.
